At the Dons, the girls' training session lasts for two hours every Monday and Wednesday, whereas at Leicester the training is only one and a half hours every Friday once a week.


Every once a month the Dons'

A: A scary moment was when a child in Tirabad threw a strop (because he was angry and frustrated) and unhooked his safety rope while climbing a rock!


My most enjoyable is definitely being with the children!
